

Key Points


- In 2021/22, 35% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was worse than the average London Borough.
- 44% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was worse than the average London Borough.
- In Newham, 20% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- Unemployment change in 2023 Q3 at 0 percentage points from 3 years ago was around the same as the average London Borough.
- Pay inequality as measured by the ratio of wages at the 80th percentile to the 20th percentile in 2023 was around the same as the average London Borough at (2.39).
- There were 4.46 repossessions by county court bailiffs per 1,000 in Newham in 2022 Q4 - 2023 Q3, worse than the average London Borough.
- There were 48.75 households per 1,000 in temporary accomodation in 2022 Q4, worse than the average London Borough.

Income estimates 2018








Households in temporary accommodation per 1,000
