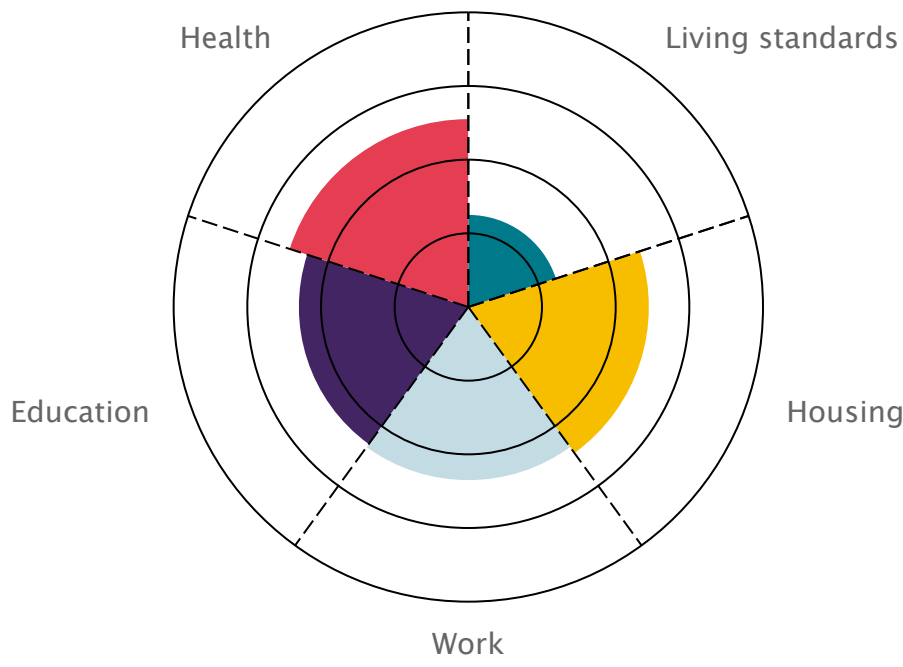

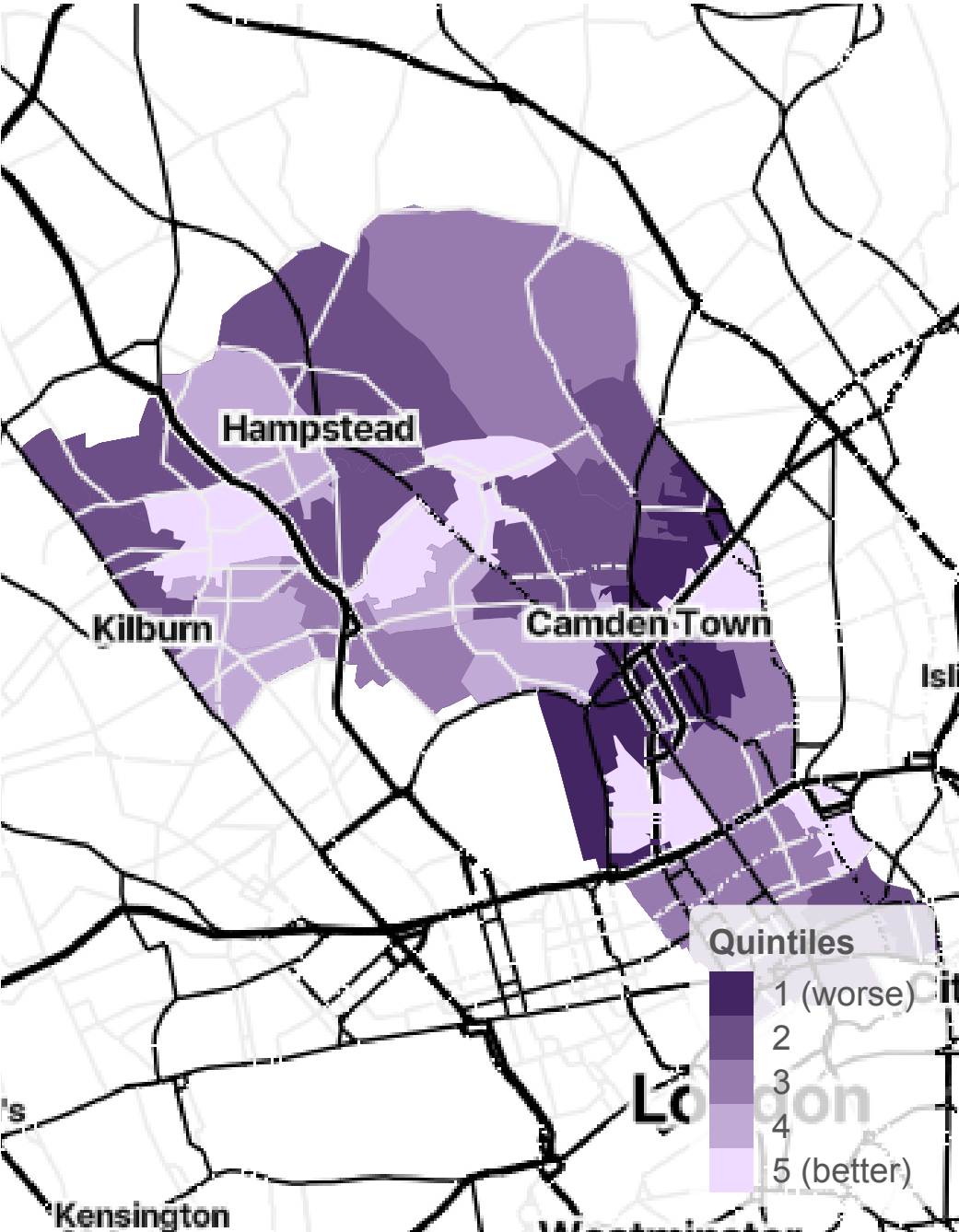


The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Key Points

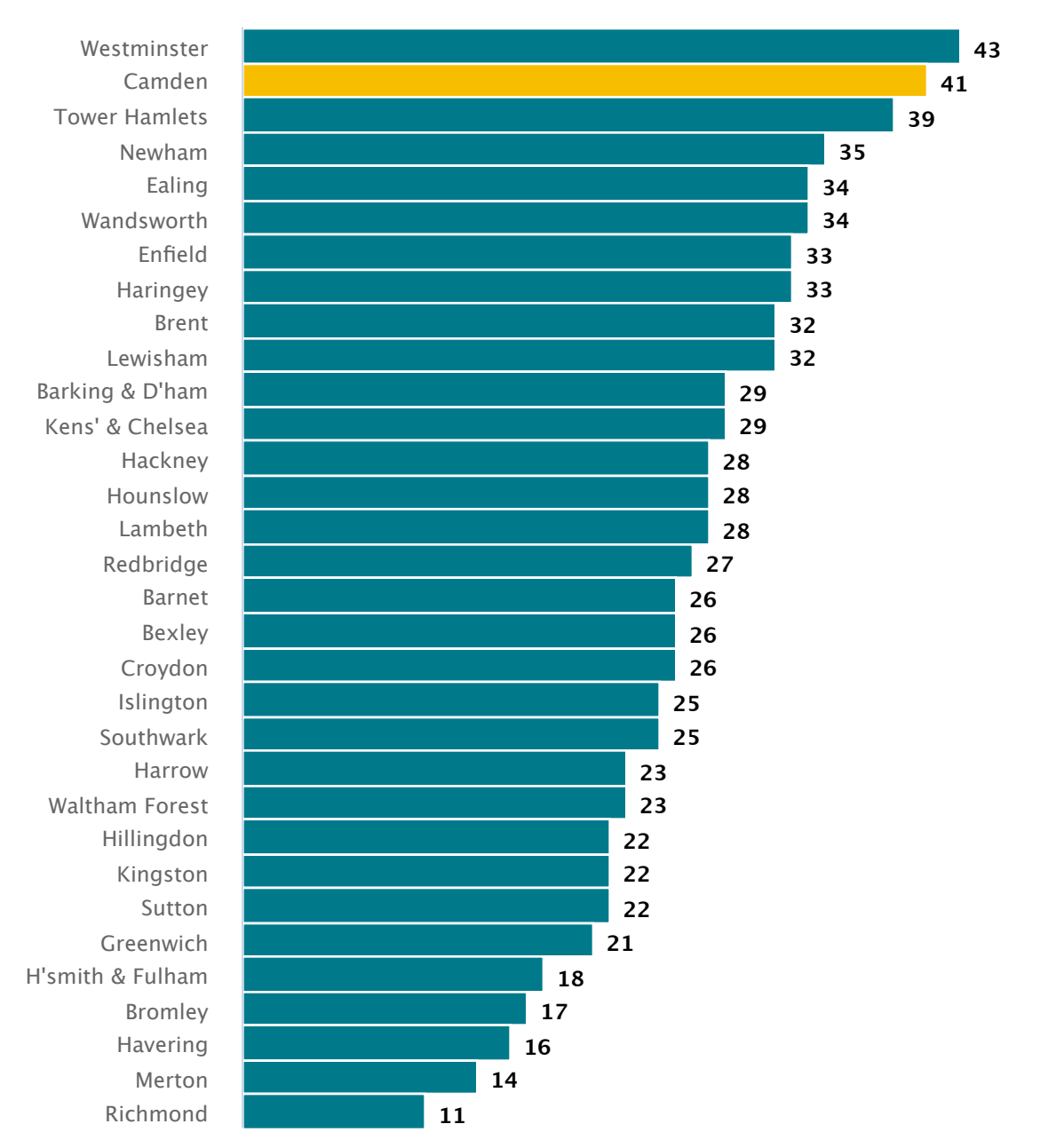
- In 2021/22, 41% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was worse than the average London Borough.
- 40% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was worse than the average London Borough.
- In Camden, 12.2% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- Camden owed 0.26 per 1,000 households a main homelessness duty in 2023 Q1, better than the average London Borough.
- There were 0.89 repossessions by county court bailiffs per 1,000 in Camden in 2022 Q4 - 2023 Q3, better than the average London Borough.
- Average rent for a one-bedroom house or flat on the private market was at least 57.2 percent of median pre-tax pay in London in October 2022 to September 2023. This was worse than the average London Borough.

Income estimates 2018



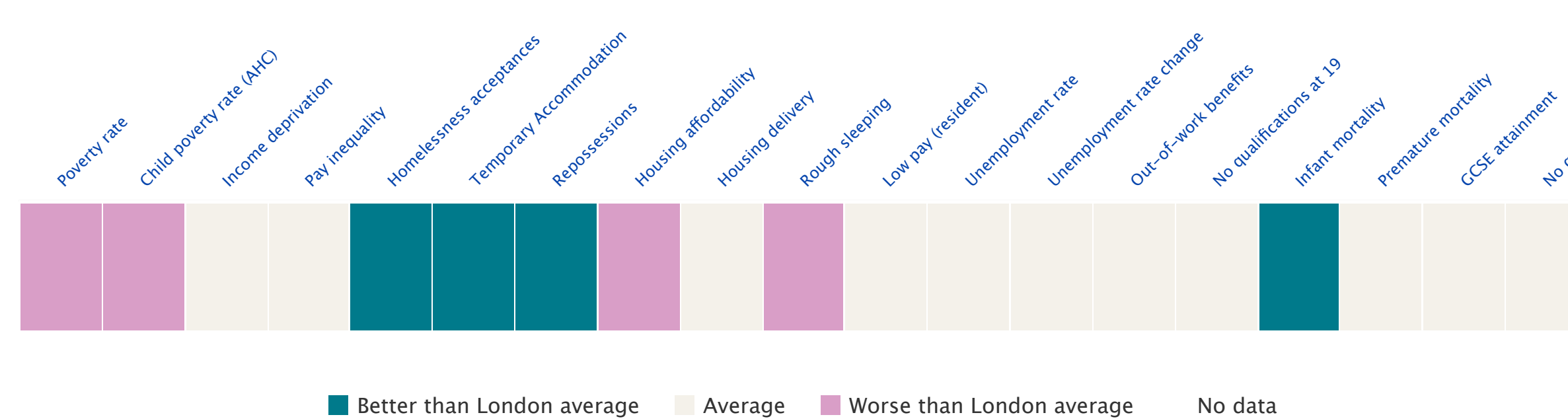

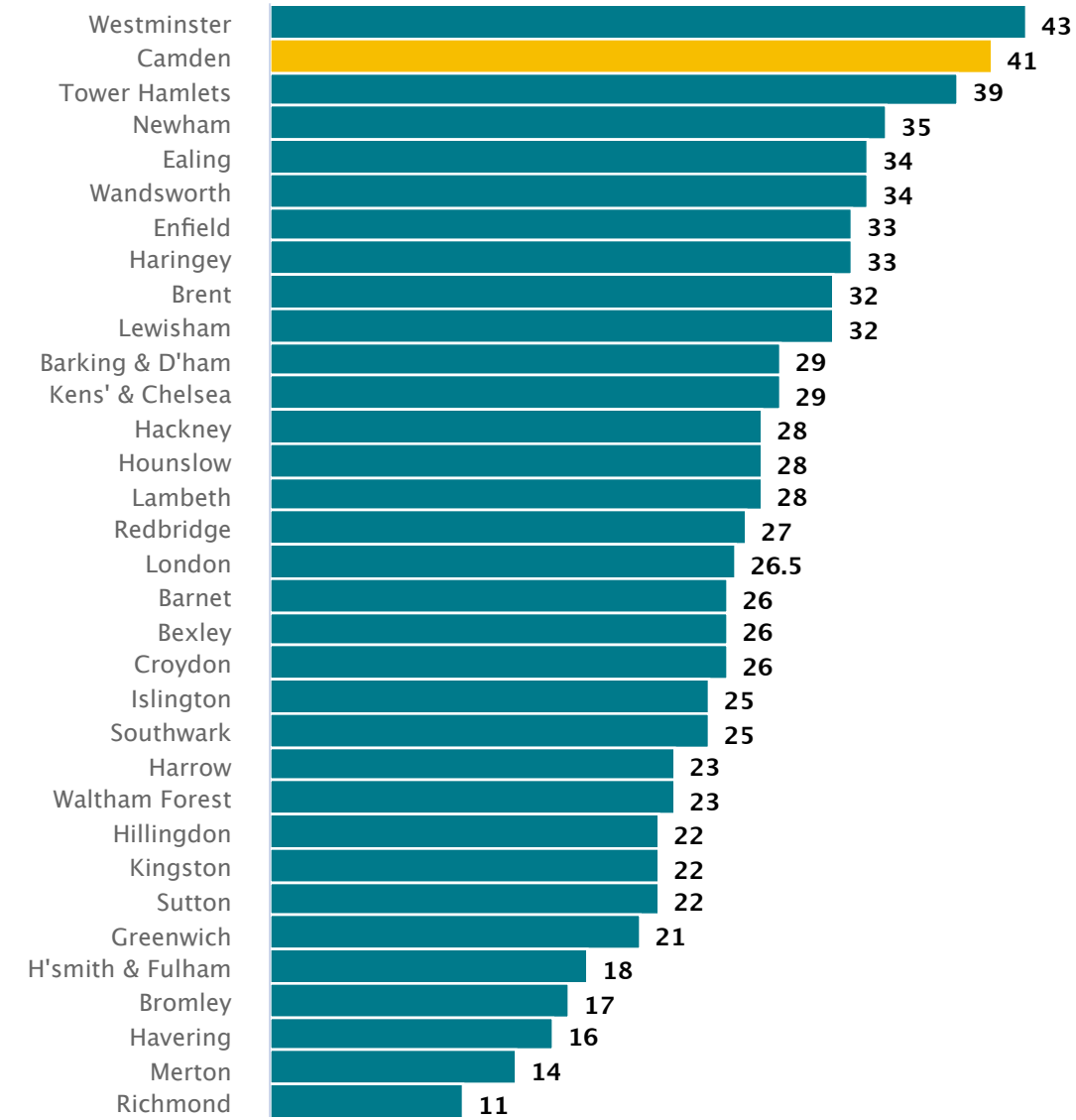
Camden ratings across key indicators

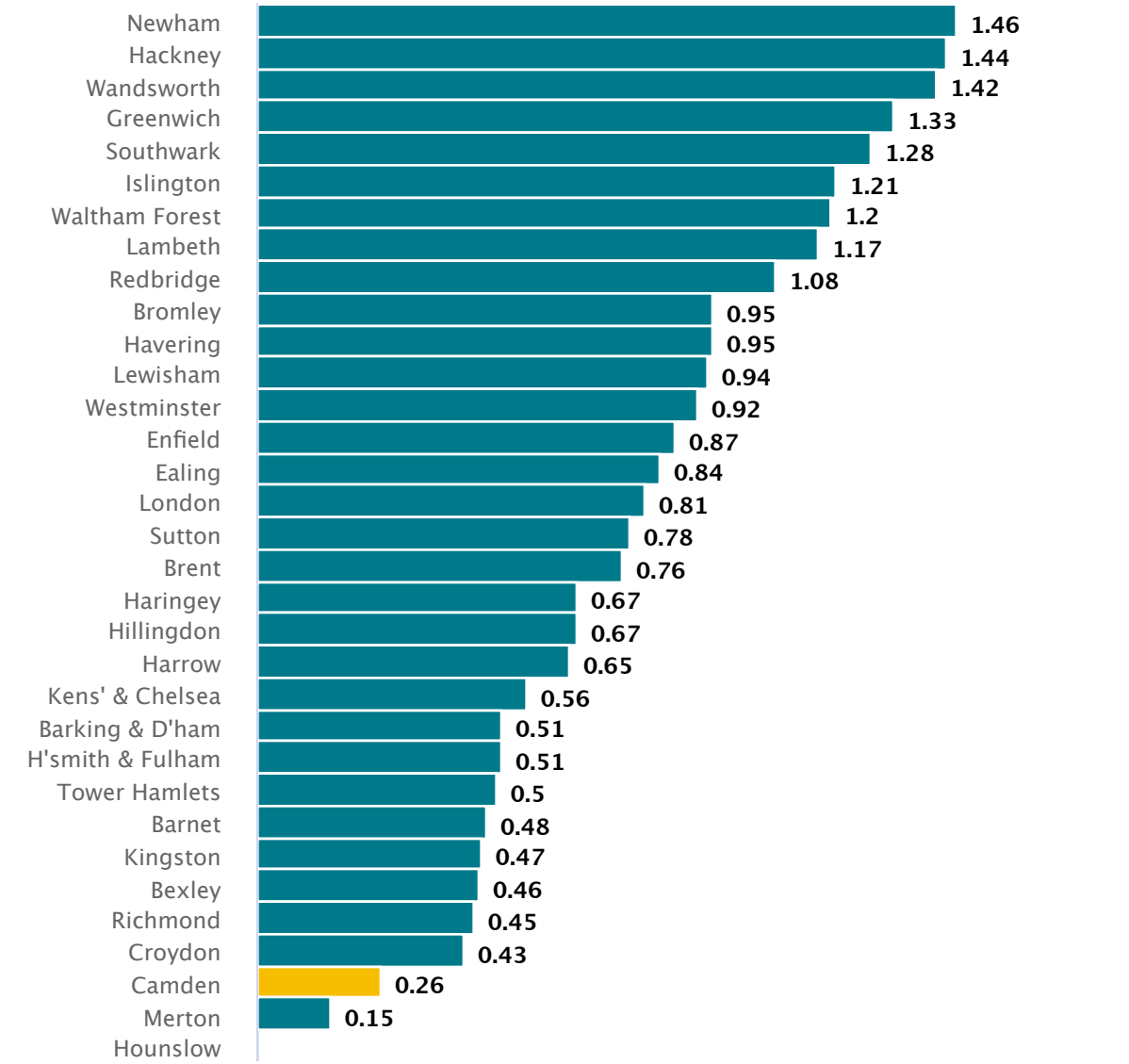
