




The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Key Points


- In 2021/22, 32% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 36% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Brent, 23.3% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was worse than the average London Borough.
- Affordable, social and other discounted housing completions were better than in Brent the average London Borough, with 1112 delivered in 2020/21 2022/23.
- Unemployment change in 2023 Q4 at -1.3 percentage points from 3 years ago was better than the average London Borough.
- There were 3.45 repossessions by county court bailiffs per 1,000 in Brent in 2022 Q4 2023 Q3, worse than the average London Borough.


Proportion of borough residents' jobs that are low paid
