




The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better


#### **Key Points**

- In 2021/22, 14% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was better than the average London Borough.
- 27% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Merton, 13.1% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 2.3% of adults in the borough had no recognised qualifications in 2021. This was better than the average London Borough.
- Unemployment change in 2023 Q4 at 2.2 percentage points from 3 years ago was worse than the average London Borough.
- Pay inequality as measured by the ratio of wages at the 80th percentile to the 20th percentile in 2023 was worse than the average London Borough at (2.65).

#### Poverty rate 2021/2022



### Merton ratings across key indicators






