




The chart above summarises the boroughs' indicators across each of our themes. The center represents worse performance, outer rings better

Key Points


- In 2021/22, 34% of people in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- 26% of children in the borough lived in households with an income of less than 60% the UK median after housing costs have been subtracted in 2021/22. This was around the same as the average London Borough.
- In Wandsworth, 9.7% of residents were estimated to be earning below the Living Wage in 2023. This was better than the average London Borough.
- In and 2023 there were 8.5% of working-age residents of Wandsworth on out-of-work benefits. better than the average London Borough.
- Pay inequality as measured by the ratio of wages at the 80th percentile to the 20th percentile in 2023 was worse than the average London Borough at (2.63).
- Wandsworth owed 1.57 per 1,000 households a main homelessness duty in 2023 Q3, worse than the average London Borough.


Wandsworth ratings across key indicators


