



Gerald Manners – who was Chair for 8 years – 1996 -2004. He loved the formality but always a glass of red wine after a lengthy board meeting. In those days the summer reception was limited to Trustees only, with you and Sally of course. How things have changed!!

And then there was the first Woman Chair for CPF – something you were very proud of...

Always immaculately dressed, intelligent, confident, thoughtful, reflective, a twinkle in eye and always listening intently to hear all sides of an issue. These qualities are those of leaders – and that's you Bharat.

Over 23 years you have moved the City Parochial Foundation into the Trust for London, seen massive changes to the grants programmes and procedures, keeping your ear to the ground and making sure the priorities are lived by, and shaped by, individuals and communities.

We started together as mere advisers in the creation of the original Trust for London, back in the 80s and moved to becoming a trustee of the City Parochial Foundation – such an honour. I was on the recruitment panel when Tim (Cook) retired and you became the CEO. A few years later I became your Chair. We have laughed together, had ideas together, chewed over problems together and aged together.

We have shared success together – a short anecdote. I was sitting in my office at Womankind around 5.00 pm and I was told that Bharat was in reception. I found you, black tie on, saying "Are you ready". To my horror

I had forgotten we were going to the Charity Awards ceremony. I was definitely not dressed appropriately and was shame-faced for my forgetfulness. Off we went in the taxi to this exotic event with dinner first, and then the awards. Yes, we won the Grantmaker of the Year Award for our work with asylum seekers and refugees. So proud we were. And a few years later the Trust won this award again for work on the Living Wage – showing that under your leadership the Trust championed unpopular issues resulting in changes of policy.

A formidable career at the Trust for which you will be remembered, and will continue to be asked about. I am so pleased we have become personal friends – no escaping me – and we will now continue to share the aging process!

I was a very new Trustee of City Parochial Foundation when you were appointed, but it was immediately clear to me that you were a considerable force for good. Your thoughtfulness, approachability and informality, and your unwillingness to accept that that the present had to be like the past, was a breath of fresh air in a charity largely stuck in the traditions of its historic origins.

Over the next eleven years I saw how your quiet and unassuming manner, your determination to do what was right and your shrewd handling of people enabled sweeping changes in archaic governance, loosened the financial restrictions shackling charitable spend and provided sustainability through diversification of the endowment. And all this modernisation was epitomised in your skilful handling of the merger with our sister charity and rebranding as Trust for London.

Remarkable as these changes were, they were dwarfed by what you achieved for our beneficiaries. You did not believe (as many Trustees still did in 1998) in the Victorian ethos of doing good by stealth. Bharat, you knew that Trust for London should be seen campaigning on the key issues that mattered for the poor of London, no matter how unpopular. In my time on the Board, for example, the charity was an early mover on knife crime, female genital mutilation, faith-based abuse, and the London Living Wage. Your vision, compassion and leadership on these issues has had a lasting legacy in London, and by example, across the United Kingdom.





Over the past 23 years we have funded some amazing work.

A lot of this has been challenging and complex and you always encouraged us to delve into hidden and unpopular issues, areas where other Trusts and foundations feared to tread.

You shared your insights and depth of knowledge which gave us confidence to go there, such as addressing unspoken issues within communities such as faith-based abuse or female genital mutilation. You made sure that our emphasis was always on finding those voices within the communities who needed support to bring about change. Our job was to provide funding but also to use our status and independence to create a platform amplifying those progressive voices supporting their communities.

Support for asylum seekers, refugees and migrants has always been close to your heart. You drew on your own experience of being a migrant to ensure that our approach was non-judgmental and supportive and it has formed a core part of our work over the past 23 years. You also took the Trustees with you. Do you recall when you called an emergency Board meeting in 2008 to consider a grant to London Citizens for their Strangers into Citizens campaign? This was at a time when people were starting to become more aware of the large numbers of migrants who were

'undocumented' and struggling in London. This campaign called for an amnesty so that people could regularise their status and participate fully in London life. There were some tough Trustees to convince – 'are we just supporting illegal migrants?' But you won them over and that was the start of some radical work for the Trust supporting undocumented migrants, sometimes it was like herding cats!

Whilst a lot of other funders have now got involved in funding more unpopular issues, we have continued to find new areas to push the boundaries, and you have always encouraged us to lead the way and be bold!

It was your idea to launch a special initiative to mark the bicentenary of the abolition of the transatlantic slave trade in 2007 at a time when there was very little focus on modern day slavery. This was such important work and, with our contribution, we supported some amazing organisations to raise the profile of the issue, eventually leading to the Conservative Government passing the Modern Day Slavery Act. Little did we know that one year later, one of the key activists at Anti-Slavery would become one of our grants managers! Klara brings all the knowledge and experience to continue our work to tackle insecure work and exploitation.

Bharat, you have always been there to support the grants team to venture into new territory, the freedom given to take on risky challenges and stood by the staff team to be pro-active. Two areas of work I would associate with you Bharat, which I led on, was the funding of the Council of Ex-Muslims in Britain (CEMB) and Council of Somali Organisations (CSO). Without your support and diplomacy, we may not have funded these organisations.

The Somali community to their credit have come a long way, however this wasn't the case in the early days. The Trust was seen by successive migrant communities as a sympathetic funder and at the time we naturally received more funding applications than we could fund. Some of the applications were for duplicate work, from the same borough competing with each other for limited resources.

With your support and encouragement we initiated consultative meetings to explore how we could encourage greater co-ordination to support the development of a strategic London-wide Somali organisation. This initiative presented a number of challenges, rival groups brought their previous differences to the meetings, the Trust was seen as a big supportive brother. We invested a great deal of time and funds (with City Bridge Trust). The CSO is now a nationally recognised organisation led by a strong board of young Somali leaders. Bharat you were always there in the difficult journey to establish the CSO and without your unconditional support it could have taken a different direction.

You will be greatly missed but you leave a rich legacy behind which has touched the lives of many Londoners for the better.

We worked together on the Citizenship and Integration Initiative, where you led a ground-breaking collaboration between funders, regional government and civil society to secure real change on social integration in London. You work in the most inclusive way, inviting input from people at every level, listening with your whole self, challenging thoughtfully, and weaving the whole together with skill. You are always able to make political and strategic discussions relatable and person sized, without losing sight of the London-wide prize. It's been a privilege and pleasure to work with you, and, after five years of the CII, you can be proud of the concrete change that we've secured.
